Richard M. Pfennighausen (60) December 9, 1937 – October 7, 2020





Richard M. Pfennighausen, 82, of Muskogee, Oklahoma passed away on October 7, 2020. He was born in Tulsa, Oklahoma on December 9, 1937.

At the young age of 7, Richard lost his father and was shortly thereafter hospitalized with polio.

He attended high school at RAF Station Bushy Park, London, England, Central High School (freshman 1953 and sophomore 1954), where his stepfather Elgin "Boz" Stobaugh was stationed in the U.S. Air Force.

Upon returning to Tulsa, Richard attended Spartan School of Aeronautics, where he obtained his instructor and commercial licenses, instrument rating and aircraft mechanic certification.

He proudly served his country as a member of the United States Air Force from 1956 to 1959. While in service in Midland, Texas he learned aircraft and jet mechanics.

While in Tulsa, Richard married the love of his life, Mary Lee Norvell, on December 19, 1960. They shared 59 years and 10 months of marriage together.

In 1962, Richard hired on as a pilot with Carlberg Aerial Patrol in Muskogee, Oklahoma patrolling electric transmission lines. He later purchased the company from the other partners and changed the name to Aerial Patrol and was president of the company until retiring in 2007 and selling the business.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Pfennighausen of Muskogee, Oklahoma; nephew, Charles Lynn Wilson and Tammy; great-nephew, Charles Lynn Wilson Jr. and Kim all of Claremore,

A celebration of Richard's life was October 12, 2020 at Christian Chapel with Pastor Cecil Guthrie and Pastor Charles Wilson officiating. Interment followed at Quinton City Cemetery, Haskell County, Oklahoma

I did not know what I was in for when we left Luke AFB, Glendale, Arizona, after my dad's F-86 training. We went to New York and left on the "USNS George Washington Goethals", a troop transport ship. Spent the first day in my bunk from sea sickness. You knew that it was going to be a rough night, when a special

template was placed under the tablecloth. It was arranged with cut outs for the silverware, plate, bowls and glass. It worked, nothing slid off the table.


We arrived in Southampton, England, in 1956 and wound up at Wethersfield AFB in Essex County. My dad was assigned to the 55th Fighter Squadron of the 20th Fighter Wing and flew F-100's. I completed my freshman year at Wethersfield and attended Bushy Park High School from 1957 to my graduation in 1960. Like a lot of you, I was bused from our home base to the Bushy Park dorms for the week. Looking back at my four year stay in England and at Bushy Park, these were some of the best times of my life. My dad bought a used Lotus 7 sports car, and we went racing on the weekends at some of racetracks in England. I got to meet some of the early car designers of the time during those races. Unfortunately, all of our racing photos and other England photos of me, along with my '57 yearbook, were destroyed in a fire.

After graduation, I left England for Tempe, Arizona, for college at the University of Arizona. I really could not make up my mind as to the education I wanted and floundered for some time. I decided in 1962 to join the Air Force. My dad swore me in, along with a dozen or so other recruits. My scores on my aptitude tests got me assigned to the Minuteman missile training at Chanute AFB in Illinois. After the 26-week school, I was asked to stay on as an instructor, which I gladly accepted.

Because we had to leave the Lotus 7 in England, my dad and I designed and built our own car, the Hoyt Special, in Illinois just prior to me going into the service. While I was stationed in Illinois, I would come home on weekends, if we were going to a race. It is a tube framed car with Volvo salvaged parts (notice we even used the white walled tires from the Volvo). It was fun to build and drive.

I found this composite photo of a race here in the States. A Lotus 7 is behind us in the first photo. We actually did better than him in this race, which my dad won.

Upon leaving service in 1966, I traveled to Apple Valley, California, where my parents were stationed at George AFB. I liked the area and have been here ever since. I went to work for Southern California Gas in 1975, retiring in 1992. I met my wife Kandia in the camera department at a Thrifty drug store in Victorville, where she worked in the latter part of 1976. I went into the store to buy a Polaroid camera and some film for my work and somehow got Kandia to pose for a photo with the new camera. I do not know how I got her to pose for this photo, but it was on the day I saw her for the first time. I actually have the original photo to this day on my desk, along with her name tag. She was 21 and I was 33 when this was taken. We were married on February 14th,



1977. We will be married 44 years this coming Valentine's Day in 2021.

We lived in Victorville, California, until 1979, when we bought a 5-acre parcel in Apple Valley and built our current home. Our daughter LeeAnn was born in 1984 on our 7th wedding anniversary. She was and still is, our special gift. Over these last years, we have added acreage to our estate and now have 12.5 acres. We are always building something and started adding dog kennels in 1999. From 1999 to 2019 we raised West Highland White Terriers. Our records show that between those years we had 112 litters. We retired from raising dogs in 2019 and now only have 3 Westies.

My hobby, when I am not building or repairing something for Kandia, is collecting old firearms. I even built myself an indoor firing range. Whenever I think I need another gun,

I just look at the list I made and decide I have enough, for now. And for now, I believe that is enough from an old Bushy Park student.

In looking through old papers, I found this letter & school newspaper to Frederick Milburn, Class '59!


I have the complete newspaper but just scanned the part that the White House letter refers to!

On May 27 an advance party will reach Bushy to make arrangements for temporary billeting and to set up the military parade that is to be held on the base. Also attending the graduation exercises will be Secretary of State, Mr. John Foster Dulles, and many old members of the President's military staff.
