





This year's Student Council has worked to help students at Central, to raise money for various worthy causes and to preform helpful services for the school and faculty.

Throughout the school year, the Student Council has operated the school store, in which school supplies and books for English classes were sold. The Council also maintained a suggestion box in the hall. Other services included maintaining a barrier, commonly called the Berlin Wall, in the hall to divert traffic; and forming a clean-up committee for the Teen Club.

At various times during the year, the Student Council performed special duties for the school. One was organizing the Christmas fund in which over \$210 was collected for the National Children's Homes of Britain. The Student Council also planned the Academy Doy talks. For this, the group contacted two speakers, one from the Navy and one from the Air Force, to discuss their respective academies.

The Student Council was also active in the antismoking campaign, in securing several tickets for the Robert Mayer Concerts for next year, in arranging transportation for the basketball games, in providing programs at these games, and in clearing congestion in the locker rooms.

A recent project of the Student Council was assuming responsibility for the school calendar. This was done to relieve the office staff of a great amount of work and to create a closer bond between the Council and the classes.

Sometimes during the course of the year, the duties of the group tended to be unpleasant. These times included making a list of pupils without locks on their lockers, checking smoking permits, and closing the Toen Club. Though unpleasant, these jobs were necessary for upholding the school's rules. Someone had to do them

Much of the Student Council's work, however, was enjoyable. The Student Council sponsored a darce for George Washington's birthday, and organized an all-boy cheerleading team for half time at the basketball games. The Student Council also donated and collected money to help so d the track team to France and Germany.

The year is nearly over now, and the work of the Student Council is coming to an end. Now the members can only hope that their work will be an inspiration to the Student Council of next year.

SENIORS SEE COLLOSEUM, VATIGAN ON PARENT-SPONSORED ROME TRIP

Of the 80 people who arrived in Rome from Bushy Park, 76 were seniors, chaperoned by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hedrick and Dr. and Mrs. Duane A. Young. The parent-sponsored trip lasted 10 days during which time the group saw Rome and Capri. Among the many sights seen in Rome were the Colloseum, Saint Peter's Square, the Forum, the Fountain of Trevi, the Spanish Steps, the Olympic Stadium, and the Vatican Muscum.

Leaving the Grand Hotel Hermitage by bus, the group went on several tours, one of which was classical Rome. These ruins include Hadrian's column and tomb, the Forum and surrounding Palaces of Caligula, Tiberius, Flavius, and Severius present a chaotic mass of green and white with shafts of columns

protruding above. Among the ruins a great variety of plant life adds color to a long-dead scene.

There are several ruins of the Christian era among the classical Roman remains in the Palatine section of the city. The Church of Saint Sebastian stands on the spot where he was shot to death with arrows, just outside the Palatine proper.

The Vatican Museum contains treasures of many ages and cultures. Among the more spectacular sights are cat-face kings from Egypt, several mummics also from Egypt, and rooms of Roman, Greek, and Egyptian sculptures. The museum also contains wall murals by Raphael, Michelangelo, and Titian, who signed their work with a self-portrait in the scene.


The Sistine Chapel is
