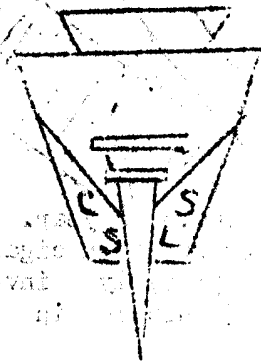
Liz Griffiths gave the background of the Battle of Agincourt. She told how the long bow, a new weapon at that time, helped the English win even though they were outnumbered.

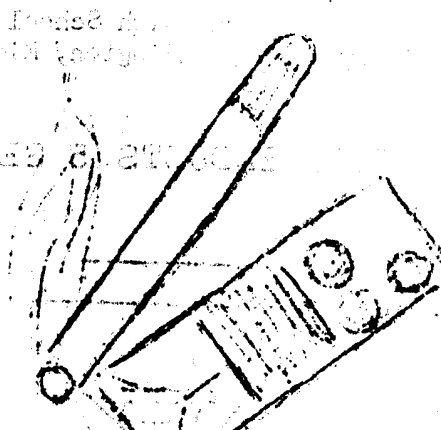

Smokers 30 Times

Heavy smokers have thirty times the chance of contracting lung cancer as non-smokers. This was revealed in a recent British report concerning the relationship between smoking and lung cancer. The report also showed that smoking lowers resistance to many other diseases.

Besides shortening the life expectancy by a few years, smoking is a very expensive habit. An American who smokes approximately one pack of cigarettes a day spends \$2.10 a week, \$9 a month,



or \$109.50 a year. This money spent on cigarettes, if properly invested, could double in seven

years. Thus, in seven years' time, while a smoker spends \$766.50 or more, the non-smoker can gain over \$1000. Therefore, the non-smoker saves \$1766.50 more than the average smoker in 7 years, over \$3000 in 10 years, and over \$25,000 in an average lifetime.

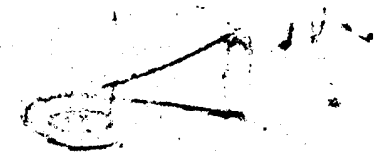

"The exhibition as a whole was very good; to us the houses are small, but many of them had some very good points."—Miss Elizabeth Ryals.

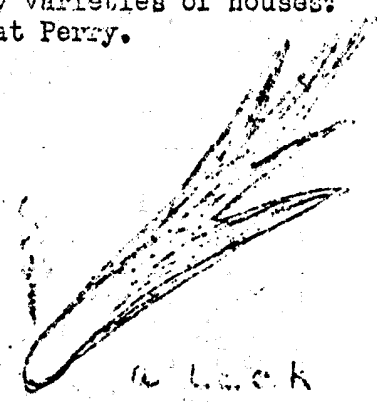
"I thought the show was very interesting and I was surprised to find so many different kinds of displays!"—Barbara Byrnes.

"It was so big and I loved the samples!"—Judy Mercier.

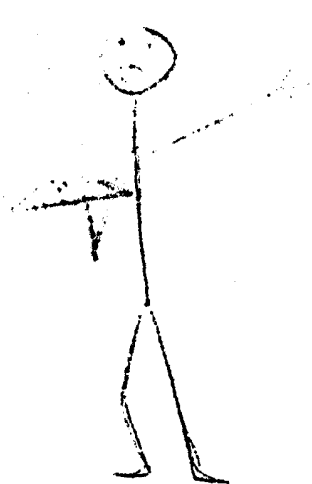
"They did an excellent job of constructing the houses. My favorite was the "house of the sun," but it wasn't up to my expectations." — Marci Hutchison.

Marion D. Hanks, former member of Eisenhower's Committee for Children, is the speaker for the graduation commencement June 8 at Wembley Town Hall.

Mr. Hanks is well known for his work in youth fitness. He served four years on President Eisenhower's National Committee for Children and Youth; was chairman of the Utah Committee for Children and Youth; and was on the board of directors for the Salvation Army and the United Fund. In March, 1961, he spoke at the American Medical Association's national convention. Mr. Hanks was a principal speaker at the opening session of the White House Conference on Children and Youth in 1960.

A graduate of the University of Utah Law School, Mr. Hanks was a petty officer on a naval submarine-chaser in the South Pacific during World War II.

Mr. Hanks is married and has five children.

Merits of Foreign Policies Debated in History Class

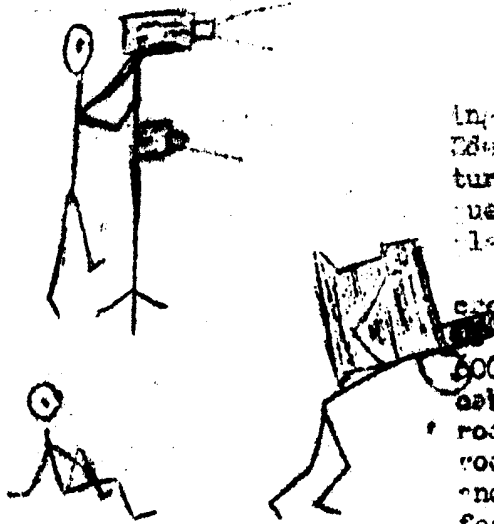

Club Plans Spring Program

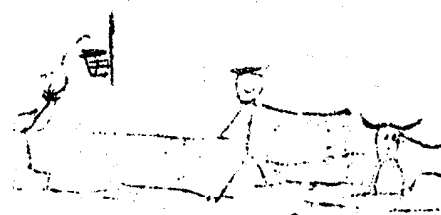
The Drama Club, sponsored by Mr. Howard Abramowitz, is planning to put on a program.
